HSOC Takes to the Skies!

he Humane Society of Concord & Greater Cabarrus County (HSOC) uses a variety of methods to find forever homes for their companion animals. Besides direct adoptions from their three locations, they also work with other rescue groups in placing pets in good homes. Sometimes this involves transporting animals long distances to specialized rescue groups, or even to individuals who find them on the Internet. Frequently, these transports mean long hours on the road for both the driver and the animals being transported, but recently, the HSOC took to the air to provide help for one of its rescues.

Brodie is a sweet Eskimo Spitz that came to the HSOC several months ago. He was found to be almost completely blind, seeing only shadows during the day and almost nothing at night. But that didn't stand in his way of being a great, playful dog, who was full of energy. He loved walks outside where he would get

very excited and nip into the air while playing.

While at the HSOC, Zach's Rescue – a local all-breed rescue that's instrumental in the HSOC's success of placing dogs and cats – arranged for Brodie to be transported to the American Eskimo Dog Rescue in Maryland. It would involve two people driving many hours to a halfway point in Richmond, VA. But, even before the details could be finalized, a group called Pilots-n-Paws stepped in to help.

Pilots-n-Paws (www.pilotsnpaws.org) is a South Carolina-based nonprofit organization that was started in 2008 by animal lover Debi Boies and pilot Jon Wehrenberg to use air transportation to quickly and safely transport rescued animals. Pilots-n-Paws presently has a network of almost 3,000 pilots and

12,000 volunteers who rescue and foster animals, and organize transportation needs. They have rescued more than 12,000 animals – primarily dogs, but also cats, snakes, pigs, birds, rats and even donkeys. They have teamed up with international rescue groups and transported military service dogs from Afghanistan. In 2010, they worked with Navy SEALS to transport an injured Steppe eagle from

Afghanistran to New York.

They not only enrich the lives of rescued animals, but also of their human companions. In 2012, the final wish of ex-Marine, Rod Calvert, who was dying of cancer, was to see his beloved yellow Labrador, Baily, for the last time. It took dozens of volunteers, and four pilots to

bring Baily the 1,100 miles to the hospice facility where Rod was being cared for. Upon arrival, she jumped into bed with Rod and put her paws on him. They spent his last three days together, with Baily never leaving his side.

Brodie's first leg of his journey would be a flight from Burlington, NC, to Richmond, VA. I met our pilot, Gene Braswell, and his son, Will, on an early Sunday morning. Brodie was excited to start his journey, and enthusiastically leapt into the back seat of Gene's Cessna Skylane. After making sure he was securely in place,

I watched as Brodie took to the skies to start his new life.

After a week-long layover in Richmond due to bad weather, Gary Schneider, flying a Cessna 172, would pilot the last leg of Brodie's adventure. Upon arrival in Maryland, Heidi Ortmeyer, executive director of Eskie Rescuers United, arranged an appointment with an ophthalmologist to help with Brodie's vision issues as much as possible.



And Cary Schneider flew him from Richmond to Maryland.

Brodie, now "Dylan," is doing great and is currently enjoying his new life at the rescue facility surrounded by other Eskimo dogs and waiting for his forever home. The HSOC would like to thank the Pilots-n-Paws organization, along with pilots Gene Braswell and Gary Schneider. We would also like to thank everyone else involved, including Zach's Rescue, and Karon Stewart and Heidi Ortmeyer from Eskie Rescuers United (www.eskierescuers.org). We hope to be able to work with these wonderful organizations in the future. •

A New Pet First-Aid App!

My collie, Ginger, hates bees with a passion. During the summer months, when the carpenter bees are buzzing, she will chase them around, snapping at them when they come into range. Imagine my panic last year when she

happened to catch one that stung her in the mouth. I immediately reached for my iPhone, but this time, not to call my vet's office, which was closed, but instead to use a recently-installed application called "Pet First Aid."

Pet First Aid is a smartphone app that is available for both the iPhone and Android phones. This app was especially developed to quickly give you the information needed if your dog or cat has an emergency. It contains dozens of articles, including detailed procedures for severe emergency situations such as choking, bites and stings, fractures and

sprains, bleeding, poisoning, burns, administering CPR and much more. It also includes general information that is helpful to pet owners, such as giving medications, restraining and disaster preparedness.

Pet First Aid contains detailed videos and step-by-step

illustrations. The content was developed by PetTech, experts in pet first-aid and emergency preparedness training. All of the information is contained within the application itself, so a data connection is not required.

This app is not designed to replace the pet care needed from your vet, but if you are a pet owner, situations like this can often occur outside of your veterinarian's normal hours, or even to a pet that is not your own.

Thankfully, Ginger recovered nicely. With the help of Pet First Aid, I found the proper way to remove the stinger, and watched her for any allergic reactions. I hope she remembers her unpleasant encounter with bees, but summer's coming, so we will see.

Pet First Aid has a 4.5 of out 5-star rating, and is available on Apple's App Store for \$3.99, and

the Android Market for \$2.99. You can also visit www.jive.me/apps/petfirstaid/ for more information. •
